# 4. Shared Services; Arena NOHFC Application Final, New Condenser, 2022 Budgets

3rd Draft and final version of the Community Enhancement Program – Enhance Your Community Stream Application to the Northern ON Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC) for \$1.2 million total eligible costs (new Condenser, new Dehumidifier, new Chiller and Brine Pump, and Ice Pad replacement) provided. South River has passed Resolutions on Feb 1, 2023 to amend the 2022 Fire Budget to \$191,105.17 municipal contributions, approved the purchase of Arena Condenser from Black and McDonald Option #2...in the amount of \$124,560 + HST per quote...dated Jan 26, 2023, support the Arena application to NOHFC, and revised Fire and Arena Shared Services Statement.

Council inquired if the Tebby Park costs have been removed from Arena as requested. No answer.

Council and any interested staff are welcome to participate or observe South River's Committee of the Whole meeting on Feb 15, 2023. Draft 1 2023 Budgets for Fire and Arena received from South River on the evening of Jan 23, 2023 were provided. The dollar increases over what we budgeted for 2022 are: \$112,449.23 for Arena and \$31,778.83 for Fire = \$144,228.06 input into OPTA (Online Property Tax Analysis) calculates an increase of 5.57% to our taxpayers for these 2 services alone.

We received Draft 2 2023 Budgets for Fire and Arena from South River late this afternoon, accompanied by several other items (pre audit year end results for our Audit purposes, NOHFC letter on Application, minutes from South River COW meeting on Jan 25, 2023, and Jan reports), however there wasn't an adequate opportunity to review it and it appears the agenda wasn't attached. We'll reach out for the Agenda with meeting link and we'll provide copies to Council.

\*Draft 2 2023 Budgets received from South River for Fire and Arena appear to be the same, with the exception of Arena Capital from \$200,000 to \$145,000. The dollar increases over what we budgeted for 2022 are: \$84,949.23 for Arena and \$31,779 for Fire = \$116,728.23 input into OPTA calculates an increase of 4.5% to our taxpayers for these 2 services. ## 9. District of Parry Sound Munic Assoc Ward 5 area rep = Lynda Carleton

DPSMA received Resolutions from all 6 municipalities within Ward #5 which resulted in a tie between Lynda Carleton and Tim Bryson. The Sec-Treas reached out to the municipalities and via Zoom proceeded to draw a name from a hat to break the tie. Lynda Carleton is the Ward #5 rep.

## 10. FONOM; MOE response Boreal Forest Medieval Village, Membership Fees

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing is taking action and has issued an Information Bulletin regarding Off-Grid Development in Unincorporated Areas. According to publicly available information and other information shared with MMAH, these communities are being marketed to hundreds of investors per property, as affordable, recreational, "low impact" developments, that seek to avoid government regulation and oversight. To the extent that living sites are not being created by plan of subdivision, they would therefore not appear to be legally conveyable lots under provincial legislation. According to BFMV marketing information, the communities are "not for profit corporations governed by member developed by-laws and annually elected Boards of Directors to help manage the community development" and BFMV purchases the properties, surveys the land, identifies half acre sites, and "distributes them according to member choices".

The Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP), the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), the Timiskaming Health Unit, adjacent municipalities, local municipal associations, local MPPs, and members of the public have all expressed concerns to MMAH. These concerns fall into several categories as follows. Servicing: sewage, drinking water, waste and planning. Adequate water and sewage servicing is essential to ensure environmental protection and people's health and safety. How each property intends to dispose of greywater to ensure no negative impacts to water quality and the environment. Details regarding the proposed drinking water source, the associated drinking water treatment if any, and the number of residences to be served by any communal drinking water system(s). Information about waste disposal from these projects and confirmation that either landfill sites in the unincorporated areas or within municipalities are willing, approved and have the capacity to accept waste from these projects. Indigenous Consultation: if the developments have the potential to impact Aboriginal and/or treaty rights adversely. Public Health and Safety: Emergency services (fire, ambulance, police). MMAH understands that BFMV communities are to be built with "primitive (roads) through the property and leading to members' sites". Emergency vehicles may not be able to navigate these primitive roads to reach the site of an emergency. An increased volume of emergency calls due to the increased number of people living on these parcels of land may create challenges with response. In addition, fire services require water resources. Building permits and building inspections are not available in unincorporated areas, but all buildings are required to comply with the provisions of the Ontario Building Code. All "owners" as defined in the Ontario Fire Code are responsible for complying with the Fire Code irrespective of whether they live in a municipality or in an unincorporated area. Impact to Adjacent Municipalities' Services and Facilities: development shall be appropriate to planned or available infrastructure, and the establishment of new permanent townsites shall not be permitted. Permanent residences are to be directed to municipalities that have the services and infrastructure to support them. Schools, hospitals, and other public service facilities should be considered to ensure they can support the current and anticipated population.

Administration expressed support for the Ministry's response as we respond to several similar inquiries. Unregulated development makes our jobs more difficult as it overflows into our municipality often resulting in anti-government sentiment or enforcement action required.

FONOM annual membership fee hasn't increased for 8 years. Fee is based on population. Membership Invoices will be emailed. Population 1,000 and under = \$176.40 for 2023-2024 year.

#### 11. NECO Community Futures Development Corp; Update to Municipalities Jan 2023

NECO is a not-for-profit funded by the Government of Canada and governed by a volunteer board of directors. Their professional staff encourage entrepreneurship and the pursuit of economic opportunities. Since 1987, they have invested more than \$30 million in business loans and community projects. Their objectives are to assist communities and businesses in the East

Nipissing/East Parry Sound region in the creation of employment through funding for community economic development initiatives and special projects, as well as providing financial assistance, counselling, training and advisory services for small businesses. <a href="https://www.neco.on.ca">www.neco.on.ca</a>

## 12. Muskoka Algonquin Healthcare minutes of Jan 6, 2023 and Stage 1.3 Site Selection Process

COVID hospitalization has been steady, noting as many as 10 cases recently on any given day across both sites over the last few months. Inpatient occupancy continues to be a challenge with over 100% occupancy at both sites, challenging patient flow with admissions in the Emergency Dept. MAHC vaccination policy remains for staff. MAHC has launched the Ontario Telestroke Program, an emergency telemedicine application that provides Emergency physicians immediate access to neurologists with expertise in stroke care to support assessment and treatment of patients experiencing acute stroke symptoms. Renovation and construction to replace the end-of-life Nuclear Medicine machine at the Huntsville site continues with completion targeted by the end of Mar. A question was raised as to whether the municipal mechanics of supporting local share are based on assessment. Board Chair indicated property assessment can be one of the tools, and decision-making with respect to the strategy rests solely with municipal partners and the Local Share Committee is happy to hear any solution. The Town of Huntsville is moving forward with a walk-in clinic in the Annex building in partnership with the Algonquin Health Team. MPP Graydon Smith shared his openness to hearing from anyone in the group that has matters to discuss.

13. Almaguin Heads of Council (Mayor Rod Ward, Township of Armour); Local Share Updates, Update from Almaguin Highlands Health Council; Approach to MAHC Hospital Build Local Share Commitments (12 for 12 in 12) total municipal commitment \$112,500,000.

Following a meeting of the Local Share Committee, MAHC has asked for preliminary potential funding numbers by Feb 15. Almaguin Highlands Health Council (AHHC) had a delegation from MAHC (Muskoka Algonquin Health Care) and also discussed some potential approaches afterward, resulting in the slide deck which was sent to AHCC members. This is a suggested approach to move things forward. Note that all municipalities in the "catchment area" (including Bracebridge, Huntsville, Gravenhurst, Muskoka Lakes, Lake of Bays, etc) are also expected to provide some sort of number by end of day Feb 15, 2023. Slide deck has been updated twice (3 copies total). Armour Mayor Rod Ward advises that Armour will be discussing both the "80% share for MAHC" and the "20% share for Almaguin Highlands" line items as part of its Feb Budget discussions for approval. Staff is analyzing the impact in advance of those discussions with Council. The approach has been tag lined "\$12-m for 12 municipalities in 12 years..." and is proposing \$198,000 from Machar = \$16,500 per year. Discussed. Machar has an ongoing financial commitment to the construction of the North Bay Regional Health Centre (\$143,173 over 20 years = \$7,158.65 year). 2022 was 16/20 payments. Council are particularly concerned about the 2023 Budget year implications and indicated no commitment to MAHC at the present time, as we're still committed to NBRHC.

Burks Falls has presented a formula by population, private dwellings, assessment, and weighted (assessment), however their assumptions are different than (those) presented. These figures suggest from \$132,294 at the low end to \$213,827 on the high end for Machar. The increase to our taxpayers when adding the \$16,500 MAHC to the \$144,228 for Fire and Arena = 6.21% tax impact.
