2. More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022 (Bill 23) MHBC Memo

Reviewed. Highlights include; Municipalities will now be required to spend or allocate 60% of parkland reserve funds at the start of each year, No one other than the applicant, the municipality, certain public bodies, and the Minister will be allowed to appeal minor variance or consent decisions, As of right zoning to permit up to 3 residential units per lot (2 in the main building and 1 in an accessory building) within fully serviced settlement areas with no minimum unit sizes, Fully services is interpreted as full water and sewer (not wells and septic), Settlement areas are often defined as land designated as Community, Public meetings no longer will be required for applications for approval of a draft (not final) Plan of Subdivision or Condominium, Architectural details and landscape design aesthetics will be removed from the scope of site plan control, Permits will not be required within regulated areas (including wetlands) for activity that is part of a development authorized under the Planning Act (in effect at a later date). Planners continue to review and analyze these major changes. Discussion ensued, noting the legislation language is very technical in nature and not easily understood by citizens in the context of planning requirements. A lot of public education will be required as citizens start to inquire and learn what the changes actually mean, many of the intricate details haven't been fully explained to the media/public.

MMAH (Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing) update on recent legislative and regulatory changes, Bill 109 the More Homes for Everyone Act, 2022, Bill 23 More Homes Built Faster, 2022, Bill 3 the Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022 and Bill 39 the Better Municipal Governance Act, 2022, Appendix A Effective Dates, Appendix B Powers

Reviewed. Additional details include; regulations established to give the Mayors in Toronto and

Ottawa strong mayor powers to help advance shared provincial-municipal priorities, including building new homes, and: Choosing to appoint the municipality's chief administrative officer, Hiring certain municipal department heads, and establish and re-organize departments, Creating committees of council, assigning their functions and appointing the Chairs and Vice Chairs, Proposing the municipal budget, subject to council amendments and a head of council veto and council override process. The Mayors of Toronto and Ottawa can also use strong mayor powers related to provincial priorities, including: Vetoing certain by-laws if the mayor is of the opinion that all or part of the by-law could potentially interfere with a provincial priority, Bringing forward matters for council consideration if the mayor is of the opinion that considering the matter could potentially advance a provincial priority, and Proposing certain municipal by-laws if the mayor is of the opinion that the proposed by-law could potentially advance a provincial priority, Council can pass these by-laws if more than 1/3 of council members vote in favour.

b. MMAH pleased to share an update on key initiatives underway to help meet government's goal of building 1.5 m new homes over the next 10 yrs, knows that building inspectors play a critical role in ensuring that new homes meet the public safety requirements set out in Ontario's Building Code, however capacity has been impacted by recruitment challenges and increasing number retiring, effective Jul 1, 2022 municipal building depts can establish program entry criteria for interns that meet their own local recruitment and enforcement needs, in coming months the ministry will develop guidance materials to support municipalities interested in launching local programs to recruit new intern building inspectors

Reviewed. Highlights include; municipal building departments can establish program entry criteria for interns that meet their own local recruitment and enforcement needs, this new internship model supports public safety by continuing to require that a qualified building inspector or Chief Building Official supervises the work of interns, in the coming months the ministry will develop guidance materials to support municipalities that are interested in launching local programs to recruit new intern building inspectors. Discussion ensued, noting staffing shortfalls are still being experienced, everywhere, in all work fields, including Building Inspectors and Planners, now amplified with the release of the new planning regulations.

3. Elections Ontario Municipal Voters List Program Newsletter, Notes

Reviewed. To improve the quality of the key input to the Voters List, the Act legislates 2 major changes. First, is the mandate for Elections Ontario to establish a single, permanent register that includes both provincial and municipal electors. Second, is the transfer of the responsibility for municipal voters list preparation from MPAC (Municipal Property Assessment Corporation) to EO. EO is making a fundamental change by shifting from a property-centric to a person-centric data model which will more accurately capture electors. This new model will be supported by data feeds from Elections Canada, Canada Post, Canada Revenue, several provincial ministries including Transportation and Health and Long Term Care, MPAC, and others. The Municipal Voters List (MVL) Program consists of four main elements: 1. Building the single elector register Jan 2021 to Dec 2022, 2. Building the municipal portal Feb 2022 to Jan 2023, 3. Enhancing online elector registration (eRegistration) Feb 2022 to Jan 2023, 4. On-boarding municipalities Jul 2023 to Jan 2024. Collection of school board support data will remain with MPAC. EO will also be reliant on elector self-reporting for some categories of data, including spousal information. These new changes are complex and will take time to implement. In addition to data sources and person-centric approach, EO will build on MPAC's outreach activities and tools that remind electors to verify and maintain their electionrelated information. In future, municipalities will benefit from outreach efforts that include Voter Registration Month, a province-wide effort in Mar of each year promoting voter registration; and promotion of the online eRegistration system where eligible citizens can register and subsequently verify and maintain their election-related information, and which will replace Voter Lookup for municipal elections beginning in 2023. Eligibility rules for municipal elections are complicated, and combining municipal and provincial elector registers risks adding to the already high level of public confusion. A further complication is that MPAC will retain responsibility for collecting and tracking school support following the transition. Exactly how electors will navigate between the register and MPAC's school system still needs to be determined. The rollout of the new single elector register has been moved from Feb to Jun 2023 due to a conflict with a pending provincial by-election in Hamilton Centre. The transition of PLE (Preliminary List of Electors) responsibilities remains on track

for Jan 2024. Responsibility for determining eligibility for inclusion on voters list remains the responsibility of the municipal clerk or delegate. Since current municipal and provincial eligibility rules differ, the CEO's legislated guiding principle is to ensure that the elector register is accurate as reasonably possible. With this guiding principle in mind the proposed register entitlement rules aim to strike the right balance between accuracy and elector convenience. Enumeration of Non-resident Electors: Because of the difficulty in verifying proof of tenancy for non-resident electors, under the proposed policy these electors will only be added to the register in the year of a municipal general election. After the election, these electors will be removed from the register at their leased property and will have to re-register during the next general election. Unlike VoterLookup.ca, the new register will not collect school support preferences directly from electors. Those electors looking to update incorrect information will be directed to MPAC's soon-to-be-deployed school support portal. Combining municipal and provincial electoral registration adds complexity.

4. Shared Services Mayor letters, Monthly Reports for Nov; Arena and Fire

Reply received from the Village providing budget meeting schedule and attaching outstanding balances for 2022. Discussion ensued on Committee of the Whole meetings in Jan & Feb. These are not included in the new agreement. Joint Council meeting is proposed Mar 8, 2023. We have schedule conflicts with the Mar 8 date and will inquire to see if we can reschedule the meeting to Mon, Mar 6, 2023. As previously advised, the Township can still host the Joint Council meeting. With respect to the Fire and Arena Shared Services Statement attached to the Village's letter, we must advise that the Township has paid the amounts we approved for 2022. The amounts are as reflected in the Total Payments for 2022 as shown on their Statement and as we advised Apr 12, 2022. The Township's Audit for 2022 is scheduled for Feb 22, 2023 and per previous practice we're requesting the pre audit actual figures for Fire and Arena from the Village before that date.

Items provided: Arena Income Statement (Revenues 72.72% and Expenses 87.46%), Arena AP Ledger for Nov \$14,362.03 total expenditures, Fire Chief's Report for Dec 2022, Fire Income Statement (Revenues 81.61% and Expenses 62.60%), AP Ledger for Nov \$15,891.66 total expenditures, Arena Chief Operator Report for Nov (power bumps, the used Condenser installed in Jun 2022 should be a priority for the 2023 budget, new units are now estimated around \$175,000 with a 24 week delivery period, other items due for replacement are the Chiller at \$150,000 and the Dehumidifier at \$135,000, the Arena Ice Pad is estimated at \$1,000,000 and is 20 years past its life expectancy, the Olympia should be replaced in 2027 and the current cost for an electric model is \$135,000, Arena is looking to replace part time position staff member, intent is to find someone that would be interested in a full time position in the near future as some of the staff are nearing retirement, Community Centre kitchen in working order, a few finishing touches/trim to do). Discussion ensued on the large costs forthcoming in the foreseeable future, unknown how to fund.

When oil crashed in 2015, the flow reversed itself. Ontario's population growth rate almost doubled overnight, but we didn't really change how we were building housing that led to the shortage we have today. ATTACHED
